

The NJCM President and Officers cut the ribbon early Thursday morning officially kicking off the start of the 58th Annual Spring Conference. Thursday was our busiest day beginning with a productive and interesting discussion at the Legislative Committee meeting. Topics of interest that Mayors requested be added to the NJCM legislative agenda are: Reinstatement of Energy Tax Receipts; Affordable Housing, and OPRA. The committee meeting was immediately followed by a Legislative Leadership Panel that included Assembly Spreaker Craig Coughlin, Assembly Minority Leader John DiMaio, Senator Bob Smith, and Senate Republican Leader Steven V. Oroho. Moderated by Mayor Janice Mironov, East Windsor, discussion topics ranged from Pension costs, Affordable Housing, Health Benefits, Planning and Zoning to restoration of Energy Tax Receipts and the state budget. During the session, Mayor Mironov presented Senator Bob Smith, chair of the Energy and Environment Committee with an NJCM Service Award for his many years of support of the NJCM and working on behalf of the mayors in New Jersey.

The highlight of the day was the Grand Luncheon sponsored by New Jersey American Water. The luncheon opened with a Color Guard Salute led by the New Jersey State Police Honor Guard followed by a rousing rendition of the National Anthem sung by Donnah Lisa Campbell. Governor Phil Murphy gave the Keynote address and introduced his proposal for liquor license reform during his presentation. Retiring Senator Steven V. Oroho received the NJCM Arthur Ondish Award of Merit for his many years of exemplary service to the people of New Jersey.

Immediately following the luncheon, round table one on one conversations with the Governor's Cabinet members were held so that mayors were able to bring up specific topics of concern to decision makers. A panel on Environmental Regulatory Challenges moderated by Mayor Jackie Veasy, Evesham Township and Economic Development and Redevelopment led by Mayor Dean Dafis, Maplewood Township rounded out the afternoon. A general Mayors and Business Council reception sponsored by FirstNet built with AT&T closed the fun and informative day.
